

Thank you for your interest in the Junior Instructor Program!

The JI program offers young adults the opportunity to work with sailing professionals to deliver instructional camps at the Community Sailing Center. A typical day may include: helping with morning check-in and afternoon check-out, working with staff to clean up each afternoon, supporting an instructor aboard a powerboat, skippering a dinghy with or without campers aboard, or leading a fun game ashore.

Prerequisites:

- At least 15 years old
- Successful completion of a Community Sailing Center Level 3 and either a Laser or Summer Race program.
- Successful completion of the Junior Instructor Camp offered June 19-23, 2023
- Positive attitude, a willingness to work, and enthusiasm for working in a fun, fast-paced environment
- Interest in being a role model and coach for younger sailors and peers
- Commitment to the goals and mission of the CSC
- Knowledge of sailing, seamanship, and sportsmanship
- Be punctual, reliable, and work well as a member of a team and independently with basic supervision

Work Requirements:

Minimum of 2 weeks, Monday-Friday, 9 am -4 pm. Weeks do not need to be consecutive. The Junior Instructor schedule will be created according to availability and need before the beginning of the summer with continuous updates as camp enrollment fluctuates. Some opportunities for "on call" JIs may be available if our program needs dictate. JIs can also volunteer on Saturday mornings from 10 am -1 pm to assist the Saturday Free Sail program.

Benefits:

- 2 week commitment: 25% off JI Camp
- 4 week commitment: 30% off JI Camp
- Every JI gets a Dinghy Season Pass

This is a terrific opportunity to develop your teaching and leadership skills, share your passion for sailing with young people, and get out and have fun on Lake Champlain this summer!
